Brandi was born and raised in Southern California, not far from Disnevland, Not surprisingly, Disney was her first great inspiration for art and color and stirred a love for animation. She also credits an a phenomenal high school teacher who encouraged her to try a number of different mediums and techniques and eventually inspired her to pursue art as a career.



Brandi studied illustration at Cal State Long Beach and fell in love with portraiture and pursued that avenue, becoming enthralled by artist Alphonse Mucha's use of line and color. She eventually headed back to Disneyland to create portraits, then chalkboard art, murals and advertisements for local stores.

Brandi teaches both private and group classes. She demonstrates pastels yearly at the University of Oregon's Tools of the Trade show and is a member of the fine art education team with Imagination International Inc., and demonstrates Copic marker use at art stores, schools and trade shows around the West Coast. Loosey Goosey

If you are like me you may be struggling to make your paintings appear looser, yet end up discouraged by a painting that seems too tight and controlled. More experienced painters can create paintings that seem looser and more spontaneous. How do they achieve that? Probably much of that looseness comes with practice, skill, and confidence, as well as the ability to put enough into the painting to make it meaningful, but not enough to overstate it. A painting should capture the essence of the subject while creating intrigue and mystery.

Here are some hints I have gleaned from workshops for "loosening up:"

Learn to see and paint hard and soft edges. The human eye cannot focus on everything. To feel "right" some of the painting needs to be soft edges with your center of interest in focus.

Do a loose pencil sketch or study first. Quickly lay in the major shapes and values. This process will help you to learn your subject and make decisions that will guide you in your painting. Spend enough time looking at your subject so that you can paint it confidently and decisively. Once you have the values right you can use any color palette and still convey the illusion of space, depth, and form.

Simplify. Squinting your eyes will help you to see and then paint only the most important elements. Look for the shapes. Everything is a shape - a shape of light, a shape of shadow, a shape of color.

Work from largest shapes to smallest shapes. Save the smallest shapes for the very end. You may find that the painting looks finished before you've painted the smaller shapes.

Stand while you're painting if you can. This gives you a greater range of movement, allowing you to make grand gestural strokes emanating from your shoulder.

Choose a limited color palette.

Paint with large brushes and use them for as long as possible.

Paint like you're rich and not worried about "wasting" paint or paper.

Paint three of the same subject at once. Your painting will be less "precious" and you can experiment. Adopt a spirit of play as you paint.

Holding the paint brush closer to the end of the brush will give you a looser more intuitive mark.

Don't expect to create a masterpiece with every painting. Don't expect perfection. Those "imperfect" areas might just be the most interesting visually. Don't wipe off the drips. Let the accidents happen. Be a little messy.

Remember that the energy that you put into a stroke comes through in the mark itself. An energetic gestural stroke from the shoulder will convey a very different emotion than a small slow mark made by moving only the wrist. If you want to achieve looseness in your painting save these small, slow, controlled strokes for only the most necessary detail at the very end of the painting process.
