November's speaker ...

Wire Sculptor Elizabeth Berrien

Elizabeth says it took "45 years and over 95,000 hours" to learn contemporary wire sculpture. As a child she knew she wanted to be an artist. With the help



of her high school art instructor, Mr. Curin, she found her medium. He gave her some wire, with instructions to "go take this and mess with it." The habit stuck and she went on to win international awards and sell her wire sculptures around the globe.

She is largely self taught and realized "creative problem solving" brought success in art and in life. Elizabeth is inspired by nature and favors animal sculpture, but has also created human, architectural, plant and still life works that are gutsy, emotional illustrations. Each of her sculptures make viewers smile and be inspired.



Elizabeth shared two of her best tips for wanna-be artists. The first is to keep trying different things to find the medium that really excites you and is the perfect fit. The second

is "thou shall not turn down a prosperous commission." If we think we don't know how, just keep trying until we figure it out. She encourages us to "go outside our comfort zone, and that's when we'll grow."

To get started in wire sculpture we need wire and wire cutters. Any type of wire will work and the hardware store is a good place to shop. Wire is available in many metals, colors, and thicknesses. Beginners should start with shorter lengths since the only rule is "Don't poke your eye!"



Looking Back

The last half of the 1940's was a time of tremendous change for our country. People were anxious to put


the war behind them and reinvent their lives. Families were getting back together, the work force was restructuring itself, and new lives were reshaping. During the war for the first time in the 20th century, women and military ineligible young men had stepped up to fill war created jobs. The new working environment established a level of economic independence in people suffering from post- depression struggles. Families had learned to be more independent with older children caring for their siblings and adults taking advantage of a more liberal social life.

Naturally, after the war, a stroll in the park would never again suffice as a weekly outing. Social clubs, athletic clubs, churches, and charitable organizations saw a surge in memberships and innovative new ideas. The Olympia Art League was organized in 1945 by a group of women interested in joining with others to further their interest, promotion, and studies of painting.

The group was open to men and women, amateur or professional, with the only requirement being a love of art. The first meetings were held in conjunction with the Women's Club of Olympia where there would be a display of participants' art for gentle critiquing and social conversation along with refreshments after club business was concluded. At times the meeting agenda would include a talk or demonstration by a local artist, a discussion of an artist's work and style, or an art history lesson. This joint meeting relationship was soon outgrown, and the OAL moved its meetings to the basement of the State Capitol Museum. The two organizations continued to jointly sponsor events for some time.

During the first few years, exhibits such as the Washington State College Collection of Well Known Artists were jointly sponsored with the Olympia Women's Club and private patrons. The exhibits were the prominent function of the art league.

Member and juried shows would follow as the league grew in numbers and social prominence. The society pages of the "Morning Olympian" described the above mentioned event as a very successful showing on October 24th, 1946, featuring 25 well-known American painters. Hostesses for the exhibit were OAL President, Mrs. M.B. Hiberly, Vice President, Mrs. Alla Jones, and Secretary, Mrs. George Easton.

Similar articles were found in the "Morning Olympian" archives, such as the June display at the State Capitol Museum (June 15,1947) featuring thirty two paintings by local artists with the featured artist being Miss Karl Malinowski of Aberdeen. Her oil paintings included a self-portrait painted from a mirror image and an outstanding painting of skunk cabbage. The botanical rendition being described as "a magnificent glorification of the little appreciated plant."

Most events were listed in the newspaper with detailed and elaborate refreshment lists and suggestions of "Silver Donations" being collected and donated to a charitable cause such as The Children's Relief Fund, as a part of OAL's mission to serve not only its members, but also its community.

Marz has been a member of OAL for four years, about the same time she picked up her art practice after a years-long hiatus. When asked about the medium she works in, Marz said, "just about everything". But she favors certain mediums for



different uses. "I use oils for plein air, pastels for quick color studies, acrylics for large abstract, and watercolor for my sketchbook. I grab whatever medium suits my mood for the day."

She calls herself an abstract impressionist and focuses on landscapes and seascapes. In 2020, she plans on focusing on the figure. "I'm inspired by atmosphere. Light and color effects are interesting, but it's atmosphere that really takes my breath away. The atmosphere created by the low light of winter that we see right now is really special."



"I'm an endurance athlete and like to combine my love of running and cycling with painting. I've developed a tiny oil painting kit that fits in the pocket of my cycling jerseys so I can stop and paint if something catches my eye while I'm out on a training ride or run. <u>Plein Air Maga-</u>
