Artful Thoughts

One of the most amazing things about being a member of the Olympia Art League is the diversity of the members and the great variety of art our members create. I love to see our members share what they have created. It's not always an easy thing to put our art out for others to see.

For those who don't feel their art is good enough to share, I would suggest you consider joining one of the support groups in your chosen medium. The groups are smaller and might be a bit less intimidating. It's also a great way to solicit help. It's almost assured there is someone in the group who has struggled with the same problem you are having and they can help. Several of the support groups have fun challenges. Any of the support groups would love to see you there. The artist Vincent Van Gogh said, "If you hear a voice within you say 'you cannot paint,' then by all means paint, and that voice will be silenced."

Throughout history, even in the darkest days, there have always been those who created art. Art is the only way we get a glimpse of what life was like in those days long ago. Until the invention of photography, people who painted were the only ones that were able to tell us what life was like back then. But even though photography gave snapshots of the world, artists gave us the color of the world. We have a sense of what life was like for early humans because of cave paintings. Art has given us a look at the good times and the bad times. It has shown us joy and sorrow, life and death. Sometimes it's just plain fun.

No matter what was going on in the world, there has always been art. Through the eyes of artists, we see what impressed them the most. We also see the way they saw the world around them. As artists, we follow those who came before us and hopefully we leave an impression for those who follow us.

January's speaker ...

Portrait Artist Lynda Lindner



It's easy to see why Lynda's portrait paintings are award winners. Her drawings are spot on, the colors are perfectly chosen, and the lighting is attention grabbing. She generously shared some of her 'tricks of the trade' with us.

In childhood, Lynda learned the impact of value changes in a painting by only being allowed black and white for painting. The lesson stuck with her. She now always looks for strong light coming from the side or back when scouting for references.

Her paintings begin with a coat of mid tone color painted over the entire support. This base color is chosen from the reference by closely looking for a color and value that repeats throughout the scene and is predominate in the background. After sketching, often using a grid for accuracy, Lynda then paints the lightest lights. The darkest darks are worked in.



often using strong strokes of color to allow the lights to pop even more. She advices us to "let the background speak" by allowing the mid tone to be visible throughout the piece. She demonstrated the importance of leaving bits of the mid tone showing through the other color values. Lynda claims that by "starting with a solid mid tone all over the support, I only have to add the lights and darks and I'm finished."

Looking Back... OAL in the 50's

Politically and socially the 1950's was a time of great national pride. The post WWII economy continued primarily due to the Korean War. As a result of that conflict, there was a general patriotic upsurge as the United States had won the reputation of peace protector worldwide. It was a good time for the arts. The government was generous with financial aid to promote the capitalist lifestyle. Museums, libraries, colleges and universities, and individual artists were able to obtain grants rather easily for their artistic endeavors. Renowned art critic of the era, Clement Greenberg, shaped the art works of the 1950's. He saw modern art as an unfolding tradition and promoted the "Art Rebels" such as Jackson Pollock, Willem de Kooning, Hale Woodruff, Louise Nevelson and Helen Frankenthaler.



Through the efforts of Robert Lee Eskridge, pictured above, Olympia Art Leagu members and their friends will have an opportunity Wednesday evening to hear Hei bert Siebner of Victoria, British Columbia, discuss contemporary painting. The arist will illustrate his talk through the use of colored slides. Eskridge, well-know Olympia artist, was examining two of Siebner's prints when this Sunday Olympia photograph was taken. The Wednesday night program will begin at eight o'clock i the Coach House of the State Capitol Historical Museum.

The Olympia Art League, still in its youth, was having steady growth of importance and prestige in the area. Members were branching out and winning awards in other area shows. The Olympia Peninsula Art Exhibit at Aberdeen, the Tacoma Art League's juried show, the Bellevue Art Fair, and the Lewis County Art League's show brought merit awards to the club in 1952. In 1953 the OAL took some giant steps in establishing its footprint in Olympia's art world. The club held its first solo sponsored juried show that spring at the State Capitol Historical Museum. The club also joined the American Artist Professional Art League which honored the arts during National Art Week (first week in November) with Art Walks, studio and museum tours, juried exhibits, and promoted speaking engagements from renowned artists.

Throughout the decade numerous announcements for OAL sponsored events could be found in the local papers—workshops, presentations and lectures from wellknown Northwest artists. Solo and OAL promoted shows were frequent. OAL members and officers were establishing their own notoriety. Robert Eskridge, Doug Sandland and Della Todd frequented the Sunday society pages and graciously credited OAL with helping in their success.

As much as the OAL members enjoyed their art, they enjoyed their social hours. Dinners for show judges, after meeting social gatherings and even annual picnics were subjects of newspaper articles. The announcement for the annual summer picnic on Wednesday, August 13, 1958, asked for each artist to bring a work of art to exhibit, fried chicken, a potluck dish, family utensils, and art supplies for plein-air creations. The paintings from the picnic and art exhibit were to be hung at the next week's Southwest Washington Fair in Chehalis, Washington. The hostess for that year's picnic was Mrs. Leigh Burton, who was also co -superintendent for the fair art exhibit and vice president of OAL.
