In the 1960s and 1970s, the epicenter for the fine arts and preforming arts had shifted from the European stage to the United States. New York City and Seattle were the hubs for art movements. Terms such as Pop Art, Minimalism, Conceptual Art, and Fluxus were the new buzz words. What was considered avant-garde no longer relied on brush and canvas and instead protested fine art traditions with new forms and medias. Andy Warhol, Yayoi Kusama, Sol Le-Witt, Donald Judd, and Yoko Ono were a few of the leading players of the period.

The OAL continued to be a vital link to art for Olympia and neighboring communities. Annual art shows offered public viewings and prizewinning opportunities. Patron sponsors for the shows offered monetary and notoriety awards. The Goldberg Award (sponsored by Goldberg Furniture), The Schmidt Award, (sponsored by Adolph Schmidt, Jr. founder of Olympia Brewery) and later the Robert Eskridge memorial award were greatly esteemed and sought-after prizes. In addition to patron awards, first and second place awards were given in each category of oil, watercolor, and "other medias".

The OAL continued to be active in hosting shows at the Capitol Museum such as the Governors' National Art Tour, which featured artists from all over the United States and territories. The club had become a recognized host for the Thurston County Fair art exhibit, and also began participating twice yearly in the South Sound arts and craft show after its establishment in 1966. A portion of the proceeds from the arts and craft show was donated to Morning Side, a non-profit organization for aiding handicapped adults in training and obtaining employment.

An interesting article in the Morning Olympian pertaining to the OAL 1975 annual juried show noted that the show had grown to over 60 paintings with many entries having to be turned away due to lack of hanging space.

The author, Vance Horne, stated that the annual show was "the most represented to be seen in Olympia all year. Besides paintings, wood cuts, textile arts, scratch board, wood carvings, enamels and other media sculptures are showcased. Quite a few members of OAL are represented and many have grown in stature over the years. There is in the show a noted lack of Mt. Rainier paintings, members have gone to more difficult subjects, not so trite, maybe not as beautiful, but more mature." This show was also the first mention of a memorial award being given, a practice which would continue, the award in honor of a passing member given in the media of their choice.

Summary of guidelines

- Entrants must be residents of Western Washington and at least 18 years of age.
- ◆ Three entries per artist are allowed, but ONLY 2 can be chosen for the show. Fee: \$35 for up to 3 entries (non-members) \$30 (OAL members)
- ◆ 2 D framed art: size limits not less than 10" or more than 32" in either dimension. No 3 D work. Hanging clay, metal fabric of glass may be weight restricted.
- Artwork must be original (no reproductions) and solely the work of the applicant, created in the past 24 months at time of entry.
