A Little More History... **OAL** at the Fair

The first Thurston County Fair was held in 1871. The Columbus building downtown on 4th Avenue housed the first celebration with a bird and poultry exhibit upstairs and food, dancing and socializing downstairs. Over the next century and a half, the fair had an interesting evolution with multiple locations (once even held in Lewis county), several interruptions including a decade hiatus, and innumerable exhibit make overs.

For those interested, Ann Shipley, fair historian, has written a book titled "Memories: History of the Thurston County Fair". Art work appeared only sporadically and was included in "Home Crafts" until 1969 when the OAL became affiliated with the Fair. Due to the fast growing section reflecting the interest of the community, the Arts division was created, separating the artwork from "hobby" crafts. The Arts division was super-

vised by OAL members: Mrs. Viola Rushforth, Mrs. Cle McCoy, and Mrs. LaWana Phillips.

The art show was divided into several categories for that first year. There was a non-competitive exhibit for artists who worked as professionals and one for those artists who wanted to share their work who did not reside in Thurston County. One division consisted of OAL members "to be judged separately as to not intimidate non-OAL artists with less experience." Another division was for Panorama City artists of 75 years of age or older, and various age divisions were for Thurston County residents.

By 1971 the Arts division had become much as it is today, an open class art competition with nominal cash premiums for the top works and an exhibition for the pleasure of fair goers. A "B" section was open to professionals and non-professionals who were not residents of Thurston County for exhibition without awards.

OAL members were at the fair "for on- the-spot demonstrations of their art creations, to answer questions about their art medias, and to act as tour hostesses for those who wished to know more about the various art submissions."

Volunteering to help at the fair has been a long standing and fun aspect

of OAL history. If you have never volunteered, sign up when the call goes out this year. Bring your art supplies for your own on-the- spot show and enjoy the fair goers of all ages. After all, who doesn't like to watch an artist work?
