Ann Breckon Presents...

Gouache Resist Technique

Ann will demonstrate the gouache resist technique—the whole process—explain secrets to the technique, and answer questions. Her enthusiasm is bound to be infectious. Ann says, "For this presentation we will be playing with this intriguing watercolor technique. It is so fun! White gouache is used as a removable

masking medium over which black India ink is brushed. When the gouache is washed off, distinctive black edging, intriguing textures and a striking background are revealed, and then you paint!"

Ann began watercolor study in 1982 as a break from tending her infant twins, but art in many other forms has always been an important part of her life. Beginning watercolor was the only class being taught at the local community college, so Ann continued being a "beginner" for more than two years. Aside from those classes she has never studied formally, saying, "I learn from every book I read, every painting I study, from my artist friends, at the demonstrations held at society meetings, and from the great students in my classes. Also, every painting I do has something new to teach me. The adventure never ends."



Her serious focus on art began in the Fall of 1993 when her art was accepted into local galleries and shows. Since then, she has participated in numerous solo and group shows and both local and national exhibitions. Ann has won many awards,

juried shows, teaches workshops, and is a signature member of both the National Watercolor Society of America and the Northwest Watercolor Society.

February's speaker....

Barbara DePirro

We all know Barbara as the N.W. representative for Golden Artist Colors. She has shown us the magic of using Golden's mediums, gels, and paints. This month, Barbara shared some of her personal art with us. She disassembles ordinary things and reassembles them into sculptures based on her love of nature. She uses recycled plastic jugs, bags, bottle caps, reclaimed paper, wire, and acrylic paint. Barbara uses milk jugs cut into 1/4" wide spirals which are formed into long hanging kelp. Beautifully painted paper is cut into petals, bonded with mesh and crocheted onto wire backing to create petal wreaths. Plastic bags are twisted, reinforced with wire, painted, and shaped as vines. There is no glue used in her processes; pieces are reinforced and shapes are formed with crocheted wire. Each piece can take hundreds of hours to create.





The finished pieces are displayed indoors and outdoors, temporary and permanent. One temporary installation was a sculpture of vines carefully wound around live trees. One of her 20-foot-tall sculptures was mounted on a light post outside Bellevue's Art Museum (shown above). Her sculptures have been displayed in museums, galleries, sculpture parks, art centers and public art organizations.



Art Book Review...



<u>The Creative Habit: Learn It and</u> <u>Use It for Life</u> by Twyla Tharp

Do you ever complain that you just can't get started on an art project? Or, you get started, stop and then let your project languish until you put it on the discard stack? If those blocks and others happen to you, <u>The Creative Habit</u> might have some answers.

Twyla Tharp's premise is that, "Creativity is a habit, and the best creativity is a result of good work habits. That's it in a nutshell." The book is loaded with 32 practical exercises based on what the author has learned in her 50 year career. The exercises are fun, accessible and doable for both the beginning and advanced artist.

In "Where's Your Pencil?" Tharp reminds you to observe the world and get it down on paper. In "Coins and Chaos," she gives you an easy way to restore order and peace. In "Do a Verb," she turns your mind and body into coworkers.

A personal note: I read this book in 2009 when I first ventured into art and have used pieces of it in my work since then. Today, the book speaks to me again and I plan to read it with a new eye. Her latest book is <u>Keep It Moving: Lessons</u> for the Rest of Your Life, 2019.
