



# OAL Launches Summer Meetings Featuring Demo by Linda Selsor



To help bridge the transition between full COVID lockdown and actual live meetings, OAL will continue monthly meetings over the summer via Zoom on an experimental basis the 3rd Thursday of each month at 6:30 PM. These will be much more informal gatherings. We will still do a slide show of member art. Send photos of the work you would like to share, along with the title, medium and size to <a href="mailto:mtipublishers@msn.com">mtipublishers@msn.com</a> by the Monday prior to the Thursday Zoom meeting. In addition, by request, the opportunity to spend time in small chat rooms will be longer than 10 minutes. Finally, instead of a 45 minute presentation, one of our members will share an art tip about a technique they've tried.

Linda Selsor will kick off the summer demos by offering a brief presentation about how art journaling can help unleash your creativity. Linda maintained an art journal where she stashed samples of techniques she wanted to try on a small scale, experiments, etc. With the advent of COVID, she needed more—something to help her get out of her creative slump and help deal with the angst and stress of living amid a pandemic.



She returned to journaling, but wanted more. Linda explored art journaling on-line and combined journal writing with art. That really helped. She has since offered on-line workshops of her technique and shared tips she has picked up. Linda will do some flip-throughs of several of her journals to give you an idea of the end result. It can be a great way to jump start your day, get the creative juices flowing, and have some fun.

JoAnne Lee Sanford, 81, of Lacey, passed away May 12, 2021 at Providence St. Peter's hospital in Olympia, WA.

JoAnne was born January 20,1940 in Aberdeen, Washington, where she grew up and lived most of her life. JoAnne graduated from Aberdeen High School in 1957 and married Richard Sanford shortly thereafter.

JoAnne is survived by her sister Jocelle (Ken) Strom, her niece Kristi (Strom) Steuben, her nephew Keith Strom, and a lifetime of loving friends. She was preceded in death by her parents, and the tragic loss of her son, her only child, Jeffrey Stephen, the light and joy of her life, in March of 2011.


JoAnne worked hard all her life, most notably as Finance Director for Evergreen Counseling in Aberdeen for many years, and then for the Grays Harbor Housing Authority in Aberdeen until her retirement. She also served on many non-profit committees and boards, including as a Board Member for TwinStar Credit Union. Giving back to the community was important to JoAnne.

In her later years, when JoAnne moved to Olympia, "she began her search for a new 'tribe' that fit" as quoted by Roxie Caples. She soon found Olympia Art League and bonded with the many creative artists there. The fourth Tuesday of the month would find her crammed into a car with three of her "Art Amigas," Nicki Weber, Cynthia Walker, and Roxie Caples as they braved the traffic to attend the Northwest Watercolor Society's monthly evening meeting. Her favorite was the Daniel Smith meeting site where she spent her fortunes on new and inspiring art products. Her Amigas would often have to drag her out of the store so the workers could go home. Roxie said they had "such fun! She will be missed!"

JoAnne was a regionally renowned water color artist, perhaps most known for her seascapes and coastal paintings. Her beautiful work was greatly sought after and earned her countless awards. She nurtured this passion until the end of her life. She also loved to cook and experiment with new recipes, took countless classes, and read voraciously over the years in her constant guest to learn and grow.

Always ready with an empathetic ear, JoAnne was a dear friend to so many, even during her darkest hours. The support she offered was loyal, loving and so much fun. She was articulate and a great conversationalist with a delightful and sometimes irreverent sense of humor. She positively impacted all those she knew with her smile and cheerful nature and was a bright star in the lives of her family, friends and all that were lucky enough to have her in their lives. JoAnne will be sorely missed.

### May's speaker...

### **Becky Sciullo**



A wealth of information was shared by our May speaker, Becky Sciullo, who discussed marketing strategies. She has a website with lots of information, and does one-on-one consulting also. Becky's web address is: <a href="mailto:becky@artist-advantage.com">becky@artist-advantage.com</a>. She would love it if you would sign up for her free newsletter at this site.

Her presentation was very helpful! She offered considerable guidance and techniques to help bring attention to your site, and how to improve your outreach. Her approach takes little time and, in her experience, has had great results. She used three artists' stories as examples, and showed how her method was developed and used to increase exposure and sales for the artists.

She pointed out that now is a good time to build your business online. People are more comfortable buying online, and there are several systems that are easy to use and readily available. She discussed her preferences and methods.

To get started, Becky explained three elements that help you to promote your work. 1) Show up. This means shows, fairs, galleries etc. You make various contacts and are visible. 2) Be authentic. Create the art that you want to make, and that interests you. 3) Make connections. Send information/examples to organizations that would be interested. For example, Becky's father painted images related to bluegrass music because he plays bluegrass, and is interested in painting musicians. Contacts to a major bluegrass organization resulted in sales and commissions, as well as people interested in collecting his art.

To organize your efforts, she suggested using a blog-based system, and showed how it could be organized to your advantage, and require less time than you would expect. Her system has three basic components: 1) the central hub (blog); 2) your audience (who do you want to reach); 3) the channels (platforms such as Facebook, Instagram, Linked in, etc.)

The blog is the hub, the central component. Here, you organize your outreach, artwork for sale, art stories, your activities, and develop a relationship with your audience. Entries are made in a conversational manner and regularly updated. She emphasized that a dynamic website with stories about you and your process, are interesting to others, and help to bring people to your website. By using WordPress, or other platforms this information can be automatically distributed to other platforms.

The blog and associated platforms are used to reach your audience, as defined and developed by you for your work. Do your research; experiment with a purpose that targets people who you believe may be interested in your work rather than a scattergun approach. Find your audience by focusing on themes (landscape, still life), geography (regional interest), past purchasers, and e-commerce, for example. Even postal mail to appropriate entities can have positive results.

The various channels you use will direct people back to the website, the hub of your outreach. Use channels that make sense for your audience. Share the information systematically, and use a checklist to track your outreach. Relate stories, art news, and events you find interesting, as well as information about you.

Remember that you are in charge. This blog and associated channels are for you and your work. Also, tend to your site daily rather than waiting to dump a lot of information at one time. Ten to fifteen minutes daily can be very effective.

To help you practice this technique, she proposed some homework. Choose five pieces of your work. Once a day for five days, select a different work to write about and post it to your site. If you want to, Becky would love to see your posts.

### Art Appreciation Book Group June Theme—Baroque/Dutch



there every two months, so drop by and see the offerings through June. Shown: right is Dennis Gough's watercolor and top an abstract of Linda Selsor's.




## Northwest Pastel Society 35th Annual International Open Exhibition

### Armory Building Offered to City of Olympia

The city of Olympia recently announced an important milestone in Olympia's thirty-year quest for a community arts center. The Governor approved in the 2021 WA State Budget, that the Military Department is directed to transfer the Olympia Armory at no cost to the City of Olympia, "for use as a community asset dedicated to using the arts to support community development, arts education, and economic development initiatives." The City has until May 30, 2023 to complete an agreement for the transfer of the building.

"A working vision is to repurpose the Olympia Armory for use as a Creative Campus—a cultural anchor for building community through the arts."
