


A New Season

Annabel Kirschner



Annabel joined the Olympia Art League 10 years ago as a "wanna be" artist.

Annabel says, "It's wonderful to be around so many people who are creative in all mediums." She loves watercolors. "They 'play' with each other in such inventive ways. Flowers are creative by themselves. Landscapes are more difficult-how to decide what to leave out when you want to put it all in. I followed my artistically talented brother in school by one year in the 50's (NOT a selfesteem building period). In middle school, we had a semester of art. My brother wowed the teacher. The next year, the teacher let me know that I was NOT an artist. I was afraid to do much after that. In my late 50's encouraged my daughter to take an adult education art class. She would only do it if I did. I was amazed to find the three evening hours flew by even after an exhausting day at work. I read Drawing on the Right Side of the Brain, then joined the local art group, went to more classes, etc. and have been enjoying time with the 'right side' of my brain ever since. I truly believe that we all have a creative side in us, we just need to find it."

September's Presenter...

Eileen Bochsler

Shares her love of encaustic medium and shellac burns!



Eileen Bochsler (pronounced Boxler) has only been an OAL member since we've been on Zoom. She's been participating in the Abstract Support Group where she did a mini presentation on shellac burn techniques. We were so taken with it, we thought the larger OAL community might like to learn more about Eileen and her medium.

Art has always been a part of Eileen's life. "It feeds my soul and is an integral part of me." For years her art was representational, but it had to take a back seat as life and career took priority. When she returned to art in earnest, she switched to abstract intuitive painting. "Abstraction allows me to more fully translate my love of nature and the feelings and emotions that I experience in my world into my paintings. Encaustic painting further supports the intuitive process and teaches me to be present and not be tied to the outcome. It challenges and pushes me to grow as an artist."

Encaustic painting is an ancient painting technique dating back to the 1st century AD. Greek painters used this technique in Egypt to preserve portraits that were placed over a person's mummy as a memorial. Encaustic painting involves heating beeswax, damar resin and pigments to create a liquid that is then applied to a substrate. Just as a watercolor artist uses wet and dry to manipulate and create with watercolor paints, an encaustic painter uses heat and cold to manipulate and create with the wax.

"Encaustic painting encompasses all that is important to

me as an artist: creating luscious texture, building transparent layer upon layer and incorporating other art forms, like photography, into my work. The wax also maintains a level of unpredictability that pushes me to dig deep as I create."



More on encaustics...

One of Eileen's favorite techniques involves shellac burns using either clear or amber shellac that can be purchased at the hardware store. Eileen prefers using the dry shellac technique. She applies the wet shellac and then allows it to dry for about five minutes. She then applies heat, keeping the heat under 200 degrees, as it is highly flammable. Eileen prefers her propane torch as it offers more control. The application of heat provides rich cells and lacy effects in the painting that add texture and depth.

Variation in cell size



She shared a YouTube video of the technique. On the painting at right notice the lacy amber colored texture in the middle of the composition.



Eileen provided us with the names of several of her favorite



October's theme, Les Nabis (pronounced le nabi) were young French artists who thought art should consist of symbols and who were active from 1888 until 1900, helping to transition from impressionism to abstract and early modernism. Members included Pierre Bonnard, Maurice Denis, Édouard Vuillard, Ker-Zavier Roussel, Paul Sérusier, Paul's wife Marguérite, and about 11 others. You are free to read anything about any of them or about the group you can find. You are also encouraged to copy a painting of theirs or paint something using their methods for show at the book group.


