April Guest Speaker: Tom Richmond

Tom Richmond is one of the most successful freelance humorous illustrators working today. He has worked for Warner Brothers, Simon and Schuster, Jeff Dunham Enterprises, Time Digital, Penthouse, Marvel Comics, and Sports Illustrated for Kids, to name a few.

He attended Art College in St. Paul Minnesota. To help pay for his education, he worked his first summer in 1985 drawing caricatures at Six Flags Great America theme park in Gurnee, Illinois. He learned there that he could get paid to make fun of people and he fell in love with caricature.

After college, he went to Atlanta where he managed a caricature operation, then started his own concession operation. He later moved his family back to Minnesota, where he opened another caricature concession at Valleyfair Amusement Park in Skahopee, Minnesota.

In 1998, Tom discovered the predecessor organization to what is now called the International Society of Caricature Artists and was awarded the Caricaturist of the Year in 1998 and 1999. He also served as president of that group as well as the National Cartoonists Society. He eventually joined MAD Magazine in 2000 and became known as one of the "Usual Gang of Idiots" there. He's been honored with numerous awards during his career.

Working in all facets of cartoon and caricature, Tom has done animation character design. Achmed Junior, one of the puppets used by renowned ventriloquist Jeff Dunham, is one of his creations. In 2001, his book "The Mad Art of Caricature! A Serious Guide to Drawing Funny Faces," was published. He uses the book throughout the country when he presents workshops, of which yours truly (Martha Trupp) is an alumnus. His work has been seen in film and on television, in TV Guide, and last year his work advertised the CNN special "History of the Sitcom." On his website, he describes his background and only asks that information you learn about him not be used for evil.

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March's OAL Zoom Meeting Guest Speaker Review with Alice Liou

Our Olympia Art League Zoom speaker for March was our very own Alice Liou. Alice was born and grew up in Taiwan. She later came to the United States, studied at the University of Washington, and started a career with the state government working for DSHS.

At our meeting, Alice Liou gave us a fascinating presentation on the history of sumi art. She used wonderful illustrations of ancient and contemporary art works.

The foundation of sumi is calligraphy, which teaches the basic brushstrokes, and is an art form all its own. Generally, a study of calligraphy is first, then the application of those skills in sumi art.

Calligraphy is over 4,000 years old and is first known from pictographs. The development of inks (from soot and animal glue), brushes (from many different animals), chops (seal with a name, or word), and paper came later. As Chinese people moved to different areas, calligraphy was adopted by many cultures. For example, Korea, which had it's own script and traditions, was influenced by Chinese characters in the first century. Calligraphy and sumi were also influenced by Buddhism from India, and Zen Buddhism from Japan.

Sumi is a Japanese word meaning black ink, and "e" means painting. Sumi painting can also have poems, or script reflecting the mood or description of the scene. For example, the artist may choose the word peaceful to be written on the painting. Sumi is very conceptual. The image hints at the expression of a feeling, and may have a poem with the painting related to the scene or image. Sumi can use empty space in the composition to enhance the mood or spirit of the painting. In contrast to the more spare style of sumi is the literati style, which uses lots of detail and many components and layers throughout the painting.

The most popular themes of sumi painting are the "Four Noble Gentlemen". These are the four plants symbolizing the four seasons and human virtues. Plum represents late winter, purity and hope. The wild orchid represents spring, delicacy, and feminine beauty. Summer and masculine energy is symbolized by bamboo. Chrysanthemum is autumn and represents determination and wisdom.

Alice's presentation made for an inspirational meeting. Thank you Alice.



Statement for 'A Confident Woman'

In 1985 I attended the United Nation's Decade for Women conference in Nairobi Kenya, along with my fellow members of Zonta International, representing women in business. My experiences in Africa before, during, and after the conference changed my life in that I came away confident that I could achieve whatever I set out to accomplish. I parlayed my attendance at the conference into a graduate thesis topic - Women Networking – at the University of Michigan. I also prepared a slide show on the cultural aspects of the UN conference which I presented to Zonta clubs and conferences in the Midwestern region of the United States the following year. This pastel painting is a self-portrait from a photo of myself from that time, and expresses the self-confidence that women can possess when they develop their potential through the goals of the 1975 - 1985 UN Decade for Women: Equality, Peace, and Development. When women believe in, and trust themselves, they develop a positive outlook on life, increasing their emotional, and mental wellbeing, thereby becoming 'A Confident Woman.'

Gay shared this achievement because she felt OAL members might be interested in this online international venue to show their pictures. It is in Toronto and the artists are from all over the world. Gay said "it is fun to see the directions art is taking in various places."
