We are privileged to have LaDonna Kruger with us in person at our OAL monthly meeting on November16th at 6:30 p.m. at the Lacey Community Center.

LaDonna Kruger is an Olympia, Washington artist working in soft pastels. Her work crosses the boundaries between abstract and representational. LaDonna graduated from Central Washington University in 1998 with a BA in Fine Art. Her work has been juried into

regional and national exhibitions and has received many awards. She is a Signature Member of the Pastel Society of America (PSA) and Northwest Pastel Society (NPS), as well as achieving Master Circle status from the International Association of Pastel Societies (IAPS).

About her work LaDonna says:

"I read this excerpt from a book, Get Out of Your Head by Jennie Allen that encapsulates exactly what I strive for with my art!!

'Beauty interrupts us, it awakens us, it undoes us, it cuts us open, it restarts our hearts. I moved to Olympia two years ago and have come to really appreciate the Olympia Art League. I've enjoyed connecting with other artists in support groups and look forward to continuing involvement in the future. Presently I am having fun with acrylic and mixed media creating abstract/surrealist



works. I draw upon the intuitive, spontaneous flow of images that the subconscious holds.



I have also worked with mystical-figurative imagery for over forty years drawing upon esoteric iconography from the Buddhists and Earth honoring spiritual traditions I have practiced.

Years ago, I had several dreams in which I was a seal and did a series of pastels and paintings of seals; you just never know what might inspire you next.



I have a series of mandalas that I computer generated which you can view on my website at

marciaschenkel.com. I previously sold mounted mandala prints at Pikes Place Market and art fairs. I also print the mandalas on



cloth and embellish them with embroidery, beads and trim.



October's OAL Meeting Speaker Review — Ron Snowden



The guest speaker for the October OAL meeting was Ron Snowden, a watercolorist who has won many awards, and is a signature member of the Pacific Northwest Watercolor Society. He dis-

cussed his work while demonstrating his skills as a watercolorist. The painting he chose was illustrative of his techniques and approach to watercolor and was a beautiful demonstration.

Technically, he uses 300 lb.100% cotton paper, usually 22x30 inches. He stressed using the best materials and paints that you can. Primarily he uses M. Graham watercolor paints, and some Daniel Smith paints. He also uses several different brushes. He has both sable and squirrel brushes and has never used the former and rarely the second one. Personally, he doesn't want to harm animals, and likes synthetic brushes better anyway. His main brush is an Escoda Perla which is one of the finest quality synthetic fibers available for watercolor artists. He prefers synthetic brushes because they have lots of spring to them which allows him a more expressive style. A rigger brush, by Fabio Brunelli, is used for small details. He likes to use the biggest brush possible for the design as he paints. Using a hair dryer speeds up the drying time.

Primarily, he used yellow ochre, opera pink, and ultramarine blue plus nickel azo yellow for the demonstration. Working light to dark, and right to left, he emphasized leaving white spaces. Some corrections can be made if you don't agitate the surface by rubbing too hard, but once the white is gone, it's lost. He also likes to paint intuitively and expressively as he works. He emphasized the importance of hard and soft edges for contrast and interest.

Once the paper was taped down, he misted it with water. This provided about 4-5 minutes before it was too dry to continue before re-misting. For our demonstration he chose a floral design of flowers in a Delft pot. First, he applied the background color as a wash, in this case yellow ochre. He began to add opera pink as splashes of color. Then he outlined the area for the pot using ultramarine. When the basic concept for the design was established, he then began to build up the flowers by adding the colors in a combination of hard and soft edges, allowing the colors to mix, and using different tonal values. He used a big brush for this step. To create texture, he used a spray bottle with large droplets. This was followed by an application of alcohol both as a spray and by using the end of the brush to dot alcohol onto the surface. He also tapped the brush to create a splatter effect and turned the painting to let the paint run. As he worked, adding colors for form and shape, the image began to appear until the pot was painted using white space and ultramarine blue, and the flowers spread across the page in a diffusion of color and shape.







His advice was to practice, practice, and practice.

Living a More Vibrant Life

Many recent health studies have added some new ideas to living a life that is longer and healthier. Healthy habits may slow aging at the cellular level. The standard recommendations are still here (no smoking, alcohol in moderation, maintaining a lower body mass, a Mediterranean style diet, keep moving, get 8 hours of sleep, manage stress and taking naps (my favorite). Studies also show that hobbies and activities that have meaning for you may lengthen your life. So, we are blessed to have our love of art, but art is often a solitary activity.

New to the Surgeon Generals list is making friends. Dozens of studies show a clear link between strong social ties and a longer life. But how do we build meaningful social connections in an increasingly lonely world? A strong social network among people who gather together may boost your health. In a 12-year study of people over age 65, those who went more than once a week to group activities had higher levels of a key immune system protein than their peers who didn't.

Research has found that volunteering among adults, age 60 and over, provided benefits to physical and mental health. Volunteering increases social interaction and helps build a support system based on common interests. One of the best ways to make new friends and strengthen existing relationships is to participate in shared activities.

So we at Olympia Art League are here to assist you in living longer and healthier. We have lots of organization jobs that are already covered by one volunteer, but we need one or two backup helpers for each job. You can have a shared activity, exercise your brain by learning new stuff and create a sense of belonging and ownership for OAL. It's a winwin! 

- Artists may submit up to 3 original artworks with \$5 Entry Fee. Submissions will not be returned.
- Artwork must measure 4 by 6 inches and be on a stiff material, such as matte board, cardstock, foam core, thin wood panel or canvas board. *No glitter, no exceptions.
- ✤ Wall mounted flat work must be able to sit on a ¾^m wide ledger board.
- 3-Dimensional artwork must not exceed 6 inches in any direction and must have a stable base and be free standing.
- Artwork must not be framed or matted.
- Name of artist should appear on the back of each piece.
- Title and description optional.
